From the Lutheran Confessions

"Article IV. Justification: By nature men judge that God ought to be appeased by works. The only righteousness that reason can see is the righteousness of the law, understood as civic uprightness. So there have always been some in the world who taught only this outward righteousness to the exclusion of the righteousness of faith, and such teachers there will always be. The same thing happened among the people of Israel. The majority of the people believed that they merited the forgiveness of sins by their works, and so they multiplied sacrifices and devotions. The prophets, on the contrary, condemned this opinion and taught the righteousness of faith. The history of the people of Israel is a type of what was to happen in the church of the future. "Therefore let not pious minds be troubled by the crowd of adversaries who condemn our teaching. It is easy to evaluate their spirit, for in some doctrines they have condemned a truth so manifest and clear that their ungodliness comes out into the open. The Papal Bull of Leo X has condemned a very necessary doctrine that all Christians should hold and believe, namely, 'We ought to trust that we have been absolved, not because of our contrition but because of the Word of Christ, "Whatever you bind," etc. (Matt. 16:19).' Now in this very gathering the authors of the Confutation have condemned us in clear words for saying faith is part of penance, by which we obtain forgiveness of sin, conquer the terrors of sin, and receive peace for our conscience.

"Who does not see that this doctrine — that by faith we obtain the forgiveness of sin — is most true and certain and indispensable for all Christians? When future generations hear that such a doctrine was condemned, how can they ascribe any knowledge of Christ to those who condemned it?

"One can also judge their spirit from the unheard of cruelty which, as everyone knows, they have hitherto shown toward many godly men. We have heard in this assembly that when opinions were being expressed about our Confession, a reverend father said that no plan seemed better to him than to give an answer written in blood to our Confession written in ink. What would Phalaris say that was more cruel? Some of the princes regarded this expression as unworthy of being spoken in such an assembly.

"Although our opponents arrogate to themselves the name of the church, therefore, we know that the Church of Christ is among those who teach the Gospel of Christ, not among those who defend wicked opinions against the Gospel, as the Lord says, 'My sheep hear my voice' (John 10:27).

"Augustine says, 'The question is, where is the church? What then shall we do? Shall we seek it in our own words or in the Words of its Head, our Lord Jesus Christ? I think we should seek it in the Words of Him who is the Truth and who knows His Body best.' The judgments of our opponents will not bother us since they defend human opinions contrary to the Gospel, contrary to the authority of the holy Fathers, and contrary to the testimony of pious minds."
