From the Lutheran Confessions

"Article XXIV. The Mass: We have shown that the Scripture passages quoted against us give no support to our opponents' wicked idea that the Mass justifies ex opere operato. Good men in every country can see this. We therefore reject the error of Thomas when he writes, 'The body of the Lord, once offered on the cross for the original debt, is daily offered on the altar for daily offenses so that in this the church might have a service that reconciles God.' We also reject other common errors: that the Mass confers grace ex opere operato on one who uses it, or that it merits the remission of sins, guilt, and punishment for those to whom it is transferred, even for wicked people, if they do not put an obstacle in its way. These are the wicked and recent fictions of the ignorant monks; they destroy the glory of Christ's suffering and the righteousness of faith.

"These errors have sired endless others, like the one that Masses are valid when they are transferred to many just as when they are transferred to one. The scholastics have scales of merit, like the money-changers with gold or silver. They sell the Mass as a price for success, to merchants for good business, to hunters for good hunting, and things like that. Finally, they even transfer it to the dead and free souls from purgatorial punishment by the application of the Sacrament, though without faith the Mas does not even benefit living people. Our opponents cannot produce a syllable from the Scriptures in support of the fairy tales which they teach so authoritatively in the church; nor do they have the support of the ancient church and the Fathers. "Patristic Teaching on Sacrifice: Now that we have explained the Scripture passages that they quote against us, we must also discuss the Fathers. We are aware of the fact that the Fathers call the Mass a sacrifice; but they do not mean that the Mass confers grace ex opere operato or that it merits the remission of sins, of guilt, and of punishment for those to whom it is transferred. Where do the Fathers say anything so monstrous? They make clear that they are talking about thanksgiving; hence they call it 'eucharist.' We have already said that a eucharistic sacrifice does not merit reconciliation but comes from the reconciled, just as afflictions do not merit reconciliation but are eucharistic sacrifices when the reconciled endure them.

"This is enough of a general reply to our opponents regarding what the Fathers said. Certainly this fiction about merit ex opere operato is not found anywhere in the Fathers. But to make the whole matter clear as possible, we shall say about the use of the Sacrament what actually agrees with the Fathers and with Scripture.

"Sacrifice and the Use of the Sacrament: Some clever people imagine that the Lord's Supper was instituted for two reasons. First, it was supposed to be a mark and witness of profession, just as a certain type of hood is the mark of a particular monastic profession. In the second place, Christ was supposed to be very pleased with a mark that took the form of a meal symbolizing the mutual union and friendship among Christians because banquets are symbols of agreement and friendship. But this is a secular idea that ignores the chief use of what God has instituted. It talks only about the practice of love, which even profane and secular men understand; it does not talk about faith, whose true meaning very few understand.

"The Sacraments are not only signs among men, but signs of God's will toward us; so it is correct to define the New Testament Sacraments as signs of grace. There are two parts to a Sacrament, the sign and the Word. In the New Testament, the Word is the added promise of grace. The promise of the New Testament is the promise of the forgiveness of sins, as the text says, 'This is My Body, which is given for you,' 'this is the Cup of the New Testament in My Blood, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins.' Therefore the Word offers forgiveness of sins, while the ceremony is a sort of picture or 'seal,' as Paul calls it (Rom. 4:11), showing forth the promise. As the promise is useless unless faith accepts it, so the ceremony is useless without the faith which really believes that the forgiveness of sins is being offered here. Such a faith encourages the contrite mind. As the Word was given to arouse this faith, so the Sacrament was instituted to move the heart to believe through what it presents to the eyes. For the Holy Spirit works through the Word and the Sacraments."
