On the Church Year

"Traditionally the altar stood in the east end of the church, with the worshipers in the west, facing the rising sun, a symbol of Christ, the Light of the world. In these terms the Epistle was read from a desk or ambo on the south side of the chancel, or in smaller churches, from the south 'horn' of the altar. The Gospel was read from the north position, or from the people's left.

"Just how and why the specific readings were selected for a given Sunday is not very clear. Few seem to have any connection with the church year, a good indication that they were established very early, before there was a year. Some may have come from the ancient practice of 'lectio continua' (continuous reading) in which a whole book was read in sequence. "The ancient church held the system of appointed readings so sacred it hesitated to make changes even though the church year changed. The church of the Reformation advocated varying sets of pericopes, to cover a larger part of the Scriptures, a practice that is now winning favor also in Roman Catholic circles.

"Often the Epistle was read by an appointed lector, or even by a distinguished layman, as has for centuries been the custom in the Church of England, or as the Roman Catholic Church is again doing. The Gospel was considered especially sacred, and the book in which the lessons were inscribed was often bound in the finest leather, embellished with gold leaf and jewels, with the verses drawn in purple ink and the capitals in gold. An elaborate ceremony for reading the Gospel, still common in the Orthodox churches, included the ceremonial kiss, the ritual censing, and the solemn procession to carry it to the ambo.

"Since the Epistle and the Gospel were read from opposite sides of the chancel, the versicle which covered the time lag while the officiants moved from one position to another was called the Gradual. A 'gradus' is a step or incline, and may be evidence that the stand from which the Gospel was read was higher than the one for the Epistle. It could of course also refer to the altar steps from which the verses were sung. Luther was especially fond of the Gradual. The great Hallelujah always reminded him of choirs of angels.

"Generally the Lutheran reformers retained nearly all of the Western liturgy. What they discarded was certain practices and prayers in the fixed part of the canon which, they thought, obscured the unique sacrifice of Christ on the cross.

"In reforming the liturgy Luther was conservative. He attempted to save everything which did not appear contrary to Scripture, especially those elements which made faith tangible and which seemed to have been the practice of the apostolic church.

"Zwingli at first followed the pattern of Luther, though he was later to cut the liturgy drastically. Calvin attempted to eradicate any liturgy he could not find in the Scriptures or in the early church, and his even more drastic followers soon turned the house of God into a barren hall, without pictures, statues, altar, or even, for a time, a cross.

"In England the first Book of Common Prayer borrowed heavily from the Lutheran orders, with additional prayers from the Eastern Orthodox rites. Cranmer, its gifted editor, had spent a year and a half in Germany, studying the Lutheran forms, and married the niece of Osiander, one of the leading Lutheran liturgists. This, plus more than twenty years of practical experience with the German order, helped make the English prayer book the outstanding book it is."
