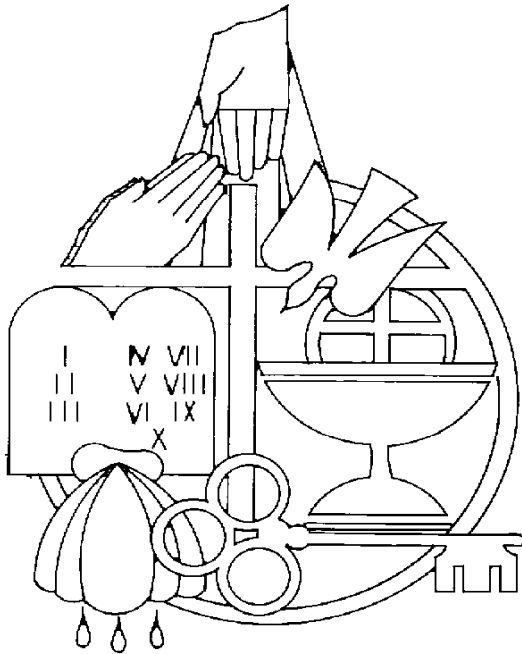

This Week in the Church Year

Repentance is the work of God, whereby He calls you away from sin and death back to Himself, to the life that is by grace through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. He works this repentance in you by His Law and His Gospel, by His Word and Holy Spirit, putting you to death and raising you to new life in Christ. So does He also use the consequences of sin, both in your own life and in the sinful world around you, as among the ways and means by which He brings you to an awareness of your sin and death. Because the curse and consequences of sin have ultimately been laid upon Christ, the Lamb of God, your contrition does not lead to despair but to repentant faith in the one who has taken away your sins (and the sins of the world). With His forgiveness, there is life and salvation!

Emphasis: Jesus Calls You to Repentance, unto Faith & Life in Him

The Catechism: The Sacrament of Holy Baptism, Part III

How can water do such great things?

Certainly not just water, but the Word of God in and with the water does these things, along with the faith which trusts this Word of God in the water. For without God’s Word the water is plain water and no Baptism. But with the Word of God it is a Baptism, that is, a life-giving water, rich in grace, and a washing of the new birth in the Holy Spirit.

As Saint Paul says in Titus, chapter three: “He saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit, Whom He poured out on us generously through Jesus Christ our Savior, so that, having been justified by His grace, we might become heirs having the hope of eternal life. This is a trustworthy saying.” (Titus 3:5–8)

Commemoration of Sts. Perpetua and Felicitas, Martyrs

Sunday, 7 March

At the beginning of the third century, the Roman emperor Septimus Severus forbade conversions to Christianity. Among those disobeying that edict were Perpetua, a young noblewoman, and her maidservant Felicitas. Both were jailed at Carthage in North Africa, along with three fellow Christians. During their imprisonment, Perpetua and Felicitas confessed their faith with such conviction that the officer in charge became a follower of Jesus. After making arrangements for the well-being of their children, Perpetua and Felicitas were executed on 7 March, A.D. 203. Tradition holds that Perpetua showed mercy to her captors by falling on a sword because they could not bear to put her to death. The story of this martyrdom has been told ever since as an encouragement to persecuted Christians.

Let each his lesson learn with care, and all the household well shall fare.

Isaiah 12:1–6: As the people of God, by faith, we give thanks unto Him, for He has taken away our sins and turned His anger away from us. No longer are we condemned by His righteous wrath and judgment. In Christ Jesus, the Lord has become our strength and our song, because He has become our salvation.

2 Corinthians 5:16–21: The Lord Jesus Christ, who knew no sin of His own, was made to be sin and the curse for us, in His sacrificial death upon the Cross, so that we receive the righteousness of God in Him. Thus, having obtained reconciliation of God and man by His Cross, He calls us to Himself by the Ministry of the Gospel, that we be reconciled to God by grace through faith in Him.

St. Luke 15:1–32: The Parable of the Prodigal Son portrays the open heart of the Father, which is opened toward us in love, in the Person of Christ Jesus, the incarnate Son of God. He has come down from heaven, into the muck and the mire of our sin and death, bearing our reproach, in order to bring us back to the Father in and with Himself. So does He eat with sinners, even us; He feeds us with His holy body and precious blood, and covers us with His righteousness.
