The Second Week of Eastertide

This Week in the Church Year

For many centuries, across the entire Church, both East and West, the Holy Gospel for the Second Sunday of Easter has been the appearance of the resurrected Christ to His Apostles—on the evening of the first Easter Sunday, when Thomas was not present, and then again on the Eighth Day of Easter, when He brought Thomas from his doubts and unbelief to faith and confidence in Him. We note especially the means of grace in this Gospel: the holy wounds of Christ, which are opened to us in His Body and Blood in the Holy Communion, and His Word of Holy Absolution in the Office of the Keys.

Emphasis: Christ Jesus Bestows His Spirit through Absolution

The Order of Daily Catechesis in Word and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of daily catechesis as you and your family are able. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Acts 3:11–21: After healing the lame man in the temple gate, St. Peter preaches the Law and the Gospel, in the name of Jesus, to the people of Jerusalem. He convicts the people of their sin, for which this Prince of Life, the Holy and Righteous One, was crucified, dead and buried. Yet, Jesus the Christ is risen! Therefore, St. Peter calls the people to repentance and refreshment in Him.

1 John 3:1–7: By the Love of God the Father, in Christ, we have become His own dear children; and when Christ, the incarnate Son, appears, we shall be like Him. Thus, our hope is fixed in Him, who has taken away our sins.

St. Luke 24:36–49: The risen Lord Jesus Christ appears to His Apostles in the upper room; and by His word of Peace and the sacred wounds of His Cross, He calls them to repentant faith and confidence in Himself and His accomplished salvation. For all of Holy Scripture has been fulfilled in Him, in His Cross and Resurrection. Now the fruits and benefits of this great salvation are delivered to all the nations, by the proclamation of repentance for the forgiveness of sins.
