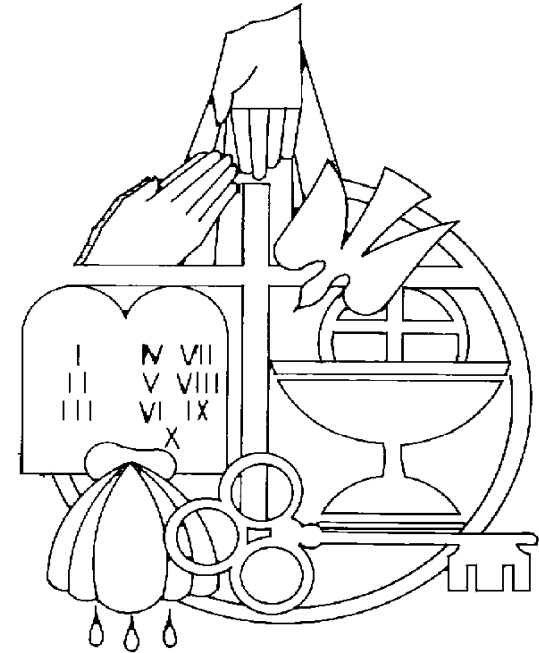
Isaiah 6:1-8: *The Prophet Isaiah is given to see the Lord God of Sabaoth in the Temple, and he is overwhelmed by the divine glory. With a burning coal from the altar, the Lord forgives Isaiah's sins and commissions him to proclaim the Word. Now the "Holy, Holy, Holy" of the angels is placed upon our lips as we are brought into the presence of the same Lord in the Holy Communion. With His Body & Blood from the altar, He forgives us all our sins and gives us life.*

Acts 2:14-36: *The continuation of St. Peter's preaching on the first Christian Pentecost calls sinners to repentance and to faith in the crucified and risen Lord Jesus Christ, who was crucified for our transgressions and raised for our justification. It is by and through Him that the Father now pours out His Spirit.*

St. John 3:1-17: *The Lord Jesus catechizes Nicodemus, and us, in the new birth of water, Word and Spirit, whereby we enter the Kingdom of God. Cleansed and sanctified by this washing of water with the Word of God, and anointed by the Holy Spirit, we are given the eyes of faith to look unto Christ upon the Cross, to fear, love and trust in Him and His salvation.*

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[*The Daily Morning or Evening Prayer, the Benedicamus, and the Benediction*]:

(Morning): We thank You, Lord God, heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ, Your dear Son, that You have graciously kept us this night from all harm and danger; and we pray that You would keep us this day also from sin and every evil, that all our doings and life may please You; for into Your hands we commend ourselves, our bodies and souls and all things; let Your holy Angel be with us, that the wicked foe may have no power over us. Amen.

(Evening): We thank You, Lord God, heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ, Your dear Son, that You have graciously kept us this day from all harm and danger; and we pray that You would forgive us all our sins, wherever we have done wrong, and graciously keep us this night; for into Your hands we commend ourselves, our bodies and souls and all things; let Your holy Angel be with us, that the wicked foe may have no power over us. Amen.

Commemoration of Queen Esther

Sunday, 24 May

Esther is the heroine of the Old Testament book that bears her name. Her Jewish name was Hadassah, which means “myrtle.” Her beauty, charm, and courage served her well as queen to King Ahasuerus. In that role she was able to save her people from the mass extermination that Haman, the king’s chief advisor, had planned. Esther’s efforts to uncover the plot resulted in the hanging of Haman on the very same gallows that he had built for Mordecai, her uncle and guardian. The king thereafter named Mordecai the minister of state in Haman’s place. This story is an example of how God intervenes on behalf of His people to deliver them from evil, as here through Esther He preserved the Old Testament people through whom the Messiah would come.

Let each his lesson learn with care, and all the household well shall fare.

[The Collects of the Week, Intercessions for each day of the week, and Special Petitions]:

Collect for the Feast of Pentecost Sunday:

O God, on the Day of Pentecost You once taught the hearts of Your faithful people by sending them the light of Your Holy Spirit. Grant us in our day by the same Spirit to have a right understanding in all things and evermore to rejoice in His holy consolation; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (Amen)

(Monday, 25 May): Collect for Pentecost Monday (and for the days following)

O God, who gave Your Holy Spirit to the Apostles, grant us that same Spirit that we may live in faith and abide in peace; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (Amen)

This Week in the Church Year

Having come from the Father and become flesh to save us, Jesus returns to the Father by the way of the Cross. His atoning sacrifice for the sins of the world reconciles God and man, and pours out His Spirit upon us unto newness of life. Indeed, the Holy Spirit breathes divine, eternal life into our dead and dried up bones, through the forgiveness of sins, in order to resurrect us, both body and soul, with Christ Jesus our Lord. He is actively present and at work in the Word of the Law and the Gospel, calling us to repentant faith in Christ, and bestowing the righteousness of Christ upon us, by grace. He convicts us of sin by the Word of the Law, forgives our sin and justifies us by the Word of the Gospel, and obtains in us the faith to say “Amen” to this righteousness of God.

Emphasis: The Holy Spirit Bestows the Righteousness of Christ
