

This Week in the Church Year

The signs of the end—and of the final judgment—are all around us, calling us daily to repentance, to be turned away from sin and death to life with God in Christ. We see all of these signs centered in the Cross of Christ, where the righteous wrath and judgment of God have been poured out entirely upon the incarnate Son of God. As He is risen from the dead, there is no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. Yet, in our sin, we are tempted and prone to wander away from Christ to all manner of false gods and self-righteousness, wherein there is no enduring life or safety from death and hell. Thus are we called, again and again, by the Word and Spirit of God, by the Law and the Gospel, to the significance of Holy Baptism: to the dying and rising of repentant faith.

Emphasis: In Repentance We Are Alert to the Coming of Christ

The Order of Daily Catechesis in Word and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of daily catechesis as you and your family are able. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

The Catechism: The Second Article of the Creed (Part III)

What is the Second Article of the Creed?

I believe in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord; Who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; He descended into hell; The third day He rose again from the dead; He ascended into heaven, and sits at the right hand of God the Father Almighty; From thence He will come to judge the living and the dead.

What does this mean?

I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the Virgin Mary, is my Lord; Who has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death.

Daily Themes for Intercessory Prayer:

Commemoration of St. Clement of Rome, Pastor

Monday, 23 November

Clement (ca. A.D. 35–100) is remembered for having established the pattern of apostolic authority that governed the Christian Church during the first and second centuries. He also insisted on keeping Christ at the center of the Church's worship and outreach. In a letter to the Christians at Corinth, he emphasized the centrality of Jesus' death and resurrection: "Let us fix our eyes on the blood of Christ, realizing how precious it is to His Father, since it was poured out for our salvation and brought the grace of repentance to the whole world" (1 Clement 6:31). Prior to suffering a martyr's death by drowning, he displayed a steadfast, Christ-like love for God's redeemed people, serving as an inspiration to future generations to continue to build the Church on the foundation of the prophets and apostles, with Christ as the one and only cornerstone.

Let each his lesson learn with care, and all the household well shall fare.

Jeremiah 33:14–16: From the root stump of Jesse, a new and greater Son of David will spring forth as a righteous branch, who shall fulfill the good Word of the Lord concerning His people. By His own righteousness, He shall save His people from their sins and establish them in the safety of His Church. So are we called by the Name of Christ our LORD, and credited with His righteousness.

1 Thessalonians 3:9–13: Through the apostolic ministry of the Gospel, the Lord establishes, fulfills, preserves and increases your faith in the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ; which, in turn, abounds in fervent love toward one another. In this faith and life, and to this purpose, we pray, praise and give thanks.

Our Lord Jesus Christ, the King and Blessed One, comes in humility and weakness, unto death, in order to reign over us in peace and love through the Gospel. This precious Gospel releases us from the bonds of sin and death, softens our stony hearts unto repentance, and opens our mouths to show forth His praise.
