

Commemoration of St. Jerome, Translator of Holy Scripture **Friday, 30 Sept**

Jerome was born in a little village on the Adriatic Sea around A.D. 345. At a young age he went to study in Rome, where he was baptized. After extensive travels, he chose the life of a monk and spent five years in the Syrian desert. There he learned Hebrew, the language of the Old Testament. After ordination at Antioch and visits to Rome and Constantinople, Jerome settled in Bethlehem. From the original Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek, he used his ability with languages to translate the Holy Scriptures of the Prophets and Apostles into Latin, the common language of his time. This translation, called the "Vulgate," served as the authoritative version of the Bible in the western Church for over 1,000 years. Considered one of the great scholars of the early church, St. Jerome died on 30 September, A.D. 420. He was originally interred at Bethlehem but his remains were eventually taken to Rome.

Let each his lesson learn with care, and all the household well shall fare.

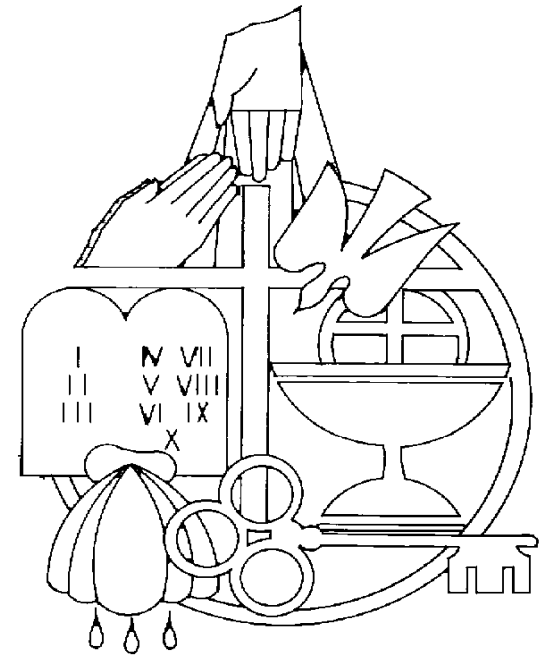

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[*The Daily Morning or Evening Prayer, the Benedicamus, and the Benediction*]:

(Morning): We thank You, Lord God, heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ, Your dear Son, that You have graciously kept us this night from all harm and danger; and we pray that You would keep us this day also from sin and every evil, that all our doings and life may please You; for into Your hands we commend ourselves, our bodies and souls and all things; let Your holy Angel be with us, that the wicked foe may have no power over us. Amen.

(Evening): We thank You, Lord God, heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ, Your dear Son, that You have graciously kept us this day from all harm and danger; and we pray that You would forgive us all our sins, wherever we have done wrong, and graciously keep us this night; for into Your hands we commend ourselves, our bodies and souls and all things; let Your holy Angel be with us, that the wicked foe may have no power over us. Amen.

The Feast of St. Michael & All Angels

Thursday, 29 September

The name of the Archangel St. Michael means, “Who is like God?” St. Michael is mentioned in the Book of the Prophet Daniel (12:1), as well as in the New Testament Epistle of St. Jude (9) and the Book of the Revelation (12:7). Daniel portrays St. Michael as the angelic helper of Israel who leads in battle against the forces of evil. In the Revelation, St. Michael and his angels fight against and defeat Satan and the evil angels, driving them out of heaven. Their victory is made possible by Christ’s own victory over Satan in His death and Resurrection, a victory announced by the voice in heaven: “Now salvation, and strength, and the kingdom of our God, and the power of His Christ have come” (7:10). St. Michael is often associated with Gabriel and Raphael, the other chief angels or archangels who surround the throne of God. Tradition names St. Michael as the patron and protector of the Church, especially as the protector of Christians at their death.

(Thursday, 29 September): Collect for the Feast of St. Michael & All Angels:

Everlasting God, You have ordained and constituted the service of angels and men in a wonderful order. Mercifully grant that, as Your holy angels always serve and worship You in heaven, so by Your appointment they may also help and defend us here on earth; through Your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (Amen)

Collect for the First Week in Angels' Tide:

O God, You are the strength of all who trust in You, and without Your aid we can do no good thing. Grant us the help of Your grace that we may please You in both will and deed; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (Amen)

- Saturday:** *For faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for pastors as they prepare to administer Christ's holy gifts; for receptive hearts and minds on the Lord's Day.*

This Week in the Church Year

In the Word of our Lord for this Sunday, the holy angels come to carry the body of poor decrepit Lazarus to Abraham's bosom in heaven. This Holy Gospel happily occurs in proximity to the Feast of St. Michael the Archangel and of all the holy angels, for whom the Church gives thanks especially this Thursday (29 September). Those great majestic creatures and mighty servants of the Holy Triune God are sent by Him to guard and keep us, and to serve us for the sake of our Lord Jesus Christ, who was for a little while made lower than the angels (in going to the Cross for us men and our salvation), but who has now been exalted, in the flesh, above all the angels (in His Resurrection & Ascension).

Emphasis: The Lord Your God Sends His Holy Angels to Guard You
