Commemoration of Noah, the faithful patriarch

Tuesday, 29 November

Noah, the son of Lamech (Gen 5:30), was instructed by God to build an ark, in which his family would find security from the destructive waters of the devastating flood that God would send upon the earth. Noah built the ark, and the rains descended for forty days and forty nights. The entire earth was flooded, destroying "every living thing that was on the face of the ground, both man and beast" (Gen. 7:23). After the flood waters subsided, the ark came to rest on the mountains of Ararat. When God confirmed that it was safe, Noah and his family and all the animals disembarked. Then Noah built an altar and offered a sacrifice of thanksgiving to God for having saved his family from destruction. A rainbow in the sky was given by God as a sign of His promise that never again would a similar flood destroy the entire earth (Gen. 8:20). Noah is remembered and honored for his obedience, believing that God would do what He said He would.

The Feast of St. Andrew, the Apostle

Wednesday, 30 November

St. Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter, was born in the Galilean village of Bethsaida. Originally a disciple of St. John the Baptist, he then became the first of Jesus' disciples (John 1:35–40). His name regularly appears in the Gospels near the top of the lists of the Twelve. It was he who first introduced his brother Simon to Jesus (John 1:41). He was, in a real sense, the first home missionary (John 1:41), as well as the first foreign missionary (John 8:22). Tradition says that he was martyred by crucifixion on a cross in the form of an X. In A.D. 357 his body is said to have been taken to the Church of the Holy Apostles in Constantinople, from which it was later removed to the cathedral of Amalfi in Italy. Centuries later he was designated the patron saint of Scotland. The Feast of St. Andrew helps to determine the beginning of the Western Church Year, since the First Sunday in Advent is always the Sunday nearest to St. Andrew's Day.



This Week in the Church Year

The historic Gospel for the First Sunday in Advent—the narrative of our Lord's entry into Jerusalem on the brink of His Passion (on "Palm Sunday")—sets the keynote, not only for the Advent Season, but for the entire Church Year and, really, for the entire Christian life: The Lord Jesus Christ, the incarnate Son of God, comes to us in voluntary meekness and humility, in order to save us. As He came into the holy city of Jerusalem, on the back of a donkey, to sacrifice Himself for the sins of the world, so does He come to His Church with the fruits of His Passion in His unassuming Word and Sacraments.

Emphasis: The Lord Comes in Humility and Meekness to Save Us Now

The Catechism: The Second Article of the Creed (Part IV)

What is the Second Article of the Creed?
