

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This Week in the Church Year

Immediately following His Baptism in the Jordan River, the Lord Jesus is driven into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil (Satan, the accuser). Undoing the failure of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden, and the failure of Old Testament Israel in the wilderness, Jesus the Christ overcomes the devil, all his works and all his ways, by His perfect faith and faithfulness: by His fear, love, and trust in His Father above everything else. In His reliance on the Word and promises of God, such as the blessing spoken at His Baptism, Jesus demonstrates the same baptismal and catechetical emphases that underlie Lent.

Emphasis: Jesus the Christ Is Our Champion Against the Devil

The Order of Daily Catechesis in Word and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of daily catechesis as you and your family are able. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

O Lord God, You led Your ancient people through the wilderness and brought them to the promised land. Guide the people of Your Church that, following our Savior, we may walk through the wilderness of this world toward the glory of the world to come; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (*Amen*)

Daily Themes for Intercessory Prayer:

Sunday: For the joy of the Resurrection; for the faithful preaching and hearing of

God's Word; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

Monday: For faith to live in the promises of Holy Baptism; for vocations and daily

work; for the unemployed; for the salvation and well-being of our neighbors; for Resurrection Lutheran Academy and other schools, our home schools, our colleges and seminaries; for good government and peace.

Tuesday: For deliverance against temptation and evil; for the addicted and despair-

ing; for the tortured and oppressed; for those struggling with sin.

Commemoration of Dr. Martin Luther, Confessor & Reformer Sunday, 18 Feb

Martin Luther, born on 10 November 1483, in Eisleben, Germany, initially began studies leading toward a degree in law. However, after a close encounter with death, he switched to the study of theology, entered an Augustinian monastery, was ordained a priest in 1505, and received a doctorate in theology in 1512. As a professor at the newly-established University of Wittenberg, his scriptural studies led him to question many of the church's teachings and practices, especially the selling of indulgences. His refusal to back down from his convictions resulted in his excommunication in 1521. Following a period of seclusion at the Wartburg castle, Luther returned to Wittenberg, where he spent the rest of his life preaching and teaching, translating the Scriptures, and writing hymns and numerous theological treatises. He is remembered and honored for his lifelong emphasis on the biblical truth that for Christ's sake God declares us righteous by grace through faith alone. He died on 18 February 1546, while visiting the town of his birth.

Commemoration of St. Polycarp of Smyrna, Bishop & Martyr Friday, 23 February
Born around A.D. 69, St. Polycarp became one of the central figures of the early church in
the second century. Apparently a disciple of the Apostle and Evangelist, St. John, Polycarp linked
the first generation of believers with later Christians. Among other connections, he was a noted
friend and colleague of St. Ignatius. After serving for many years as the Bishop of Smyrna, at a

ripe old age Polycarp was arrested, tried, and publicly executed for his faith and testimony on 23 February, A.D. 156. A precious eyewitness narrative of his death and the events surrounding it, entitled 'The Martyrdom of Polycarp,' continues to encourage believers in times of persecution.

The Feast of St. Matthias, Apostle

Saturday, 24 February

St. Matthias is one of the lesser-known Apostles. According to the early Church Fathers, Matthias was one of the 72 sent out by Jesus in St. Luke 10:1ff. After the Ascension, he was chosen by lot to fill the vacancy in the Twelve resulting from the death of Judas Iscariot (Acts 1:16–25). Early church Tradition places Matthias in a number of locations. Some historians suggest that he went to Ethiopia; others place him in Armenia, the first nation to adopt Christianity as a national religion. Martyred for his faith, Matthias may well have met his death at Colchis in Asia Minor, around A.D. 50. St. Matthias Church at Trier, Germany, claims the honor of being the final burial site for Matthias, the only one of the Apostles to be buried in Europe north of the Alps.

Let each his lesson learn with care, and all the household well shall fare.

Genesis 17:1–7, 15–16: The Lord establishes His covenant with Abraham, and promises to make of him the father of many nations; and to bless his wife, Sarah, that she would be a fruitful mother of many nations. By the Seed of Abraham, the Lord Jesus Christ, all the nations of the earth are blessed; for all those who believe in Him are the true sons and daughters of Father Abraham by faith.

Romans 5:1–11: God demonstrates His love for us in this, that while we were His sworn and bitter enemies, He gave His own beloved Son to die for us. Thus, having been justified by His blood and reconciled to God through His death, much more are we saved with Him in His Resurrection, unto life everlasting. So do we have peace with God, and genuine hope, which shall not be disappointed.

St. Mark 8:27–38: When Simon Peter, by the grace of God, confesses that Jesus is the Christ, the same Lord Jesus Christ begins to catechize His disciples in what this means for Him: that He must suffer many things, be rejected and put to death, and after three days rise again. Then Simon Peter is disciplined to think of the Cross with the mind of God; as we and all disciples of Christ Jesus are catechized to take up His Cross and follow Him through death into life.
